Brothers and Sisters in the Family of Faith,
Grace and Peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

As we enter into the New Year, there is great excitement and anticipation within our congregation. This New Year offers new beginnings, new challenges, new expectations, new experiences, new opportunities and possibilities to share our faith and mission throughout our journeys. In the church life, we review our hopes and dreams and try to align them with resolutions or practices that we believe will make life better.

When we are making personal resolutions, it is easy to pick and choose what we want to adopt or drop. But when we are talking about the church we ask these questions: What kind of life should we be pursuing? What kind of things should we adopt or drop?

The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist church describes, among other things, the ministry of all UM Christians, the essence of servant ministry and leadership, how to organize and accomplish that ministry, and how our connectional structure works. Our church extends way beyond our doorstep. It is a global church with both local and international presence.

We have the capacity, through the gifts that God has already placed within the Church to extend our reach, to touch lives in our community and wherever there is a needy soul. We have a vital mission presence and experienced capable people who serve the UM Committee on Relief and Global Ministries.

As we come to the new year, let us reflect together on these questions: What are our passions? What are we capable of? Where are we going to touch lives? We know where we have been. We can look back to the days of families filling the pews and the classrooms being fully utilized on Sunday morning. But then we have to turn and look at the days to come.

What vision do we have to continue the mission of the church, "making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world?" Changed lives change the world. If we want to be a part of what God is doing, we have to figure out what practices to adopt and which ones to drop so that we can change lives and make life better.

We are to make disciples. Jesus said, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19-20) This is the mission of the church. The possibilities are out there. We have the resources. Do we have the desire? The courage? The passion for the mission?

I pray that God will stir up a compassionate hunger in our hearts so that we may use the gifts the Holy Spirit has given, for the work God has prepared in advance for us to do.

McNulty Scholarship Applications

Habitat for Humanity Faith Build

Starting in February, our church will join other local churches in a Faith Build with the Greeley Area Habitat for Humanity. This is a commitment to raise money, to volunteer at a work day on the house, and to provide a meal for members of another church on their work day.



Here are some facts about Greeley Area Habitat for Humanity:

- Over the past 30 years Greeley Area Habitat for Humanity has built over 130 homes.
- Mentoring and homeownership support is provided throughout the home building process, ensuring homeownership success.
- In Greeley, renters pay over 50% of their pretax income on housing, leaving precious little for food, healthcare and transportation.
- In the past four (4) years Greeley Area Habitat for Humanity has put \$4.9 million back into the local economy in new construction dollars.
- 92% of Habitat homeowner children graduate from high school.



Habitat for Humanity believes that by working together, side by side, we can promote understanding and self-reliance. Having permanent and stable homes helps build strong, safe and stable communities. With a little help, we can help families in our community achieve the strength to stand on their own and thrive.

Local and Global Concerns Commission

Solomon Amuzu featured in Worldview Magazine

One of the projects that our church supports through the Local and Global Concerns Commission is Call to Nature Permaculture in Ghana. The founder of this organization, Solomon Amuzu, was recently featured in an article in Worldview Magazine, a publication of the National Peace Corps Association. Solomon has worked with US Peace Corps environmental volunteers and also studied natural and sustainable agriculture at the Institute of Tropical Agriculture.

Call to Nature Permaculture has planted 20,000 trees so far. The goal is to plant 100,000 trees by the year 2020. They've begun training volunteers and employees and plan to expand to ten acres and build a base camp of 10 small houses and a training center built out of bamboo, straw, wood, mud and waste car tires.

DID YOU KNOW?

What is the meaning of the logo? The logo of United Methodist Women depicts the symbols of the cross and the flame - symbols that also appear on the United Methodist Church emblem. Both symbols are reminders of the opportunities and obligation of discipleship. As parts of the logo, the cross and flame remind us of the PURPOSE; that we are to grow in our understanding of and willingness to participate in the global ministries of the church. They are also a reminder of the heritage of women who pioneered in service for the church at home and in other countries.

What are the opportunities of joining locally? The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, 2012, states. "In every local church there shall be an organized unit of the United Methodist Women". However, not every church has a local unit. When the numbers of women of a single church are too few to organize a unit, a unit may be formed by women from multiple churches.

Meanings & explanations of the colors and pictures in stained glass

Colors of the Bible have symbolic significance that can remind us about God and His plan of Redemption.



Blue represents heaven and is therefore viewed as a heavenly color. Sapphires reflect a beautiful sky reminding us of heaven where God dwells. It is used a symbol of wealth with its counterpart corruptions, such as vanity and idolatry. In Exodus it describes what the elders saw on Mt. Sinai. In the Old Testament blue describes hangings in holy places. An associated symbol would be water.

The **Dove** is the symbol of peace and the Holy Spirit. It is shown facing down to represent the Holy Spirit that appeared as a dove when Jesus was baptized.

White is sanctification and is in the presence of all light in the visible spectrum. It is a symbol of purity and righteousness. It is used to describe things in nature. White describes the body not only when healthy and beautiful but also when sick. It points to the righteous One and the righteousness He imputes to all who come to Him in faith.

The **Shell** is a symbol of baptism. It is also a sign of pilgrimage, as Pilgrims to the Holy Land (Israel) would use a shell as a drinking vessel.
