Brothers and Sisters in the Family of Faith,

Grace and Peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

The Season of Lent is approaching us. It is on its way. It starts with Ash Wednesday on March 6, 2019. Ash Wednesday marks a beginning of a time of self-examination, repentance, and preparation for the celebration of Easter.

In the early church, Lent was first practiced as a few days of fasting for those who would be baptized on Easter. Ultimately, this time of preparation was lengthened to 40 days, and the practice of fasting was extended to all Christians (Catholic and Orthodox). It is only in the last few decades that the idea of fasting (giving up something) has become more popular among Protestant churches.

This year, I am hoping that as a congregation, we can focus less on what we should give up and more on the idea of self-examination and preparation for Holy Week followed by the joy and the celebration of Easter.

I would like to ask you to take a look at our church and our ministry in different levels here in the FUMC and throughout the community. While this may be tricky and uneasy, self-examination is an important aspect of Christian discipleship and of being the church. Without self-examination, we become stagnant in our spiritual journey.

So, I'm asking you to consider the following questions over the next few weeks: Where and how has God been calling you in your own spiritual journey? Where is God calling you now? How have you responded to God's call to discipleship? Where and how has God been calling the FUMC to be the Body of Christ (God's hands and feet)? Where is God calling us now? How have we, as a congregation, responded to God's call? Do we believe that with God's help, we can grow and flourish into what God calls us to be?

When you receive the Messenger, I invite you to start the process of self-examination and preparation for the Holy Week and the joy of Easter. I invite you to spend some times pondering each question in the presence of God. I also invite you at the beginning of each week to ask God to show you the answer(s) to the question(s), and then to spend the rest of your week truly open to God's direction.

I would love to hear how this is going for you. If you find it helpful, let me know. If you find it difficult or not at all helpful, please let me know of that, too.

Come when you can...stay as long as you can. Our volunteers fill anywhere from 1,000 to 2,500 each time.

Donation boxes are kept out year round (even when we aren't doing a food drive). These are for nonperishable items. Please know the Weld Food Bank will not accept items that have passed the "Best if Used by" or "Expiration" date. Please check these before leaving them at the church. They also cannot accept items that have been opened or used.

**Did you know...** in 2020 First United Methodist Church, Greeley will be celebrating 150 years? Here is something interesting you might not know:

- 1870 The town of Union Colony (later renamed Greeley) was established in Colorado.
- 1870 Six churches were begun in Union Colony, one of which was the Methodist Episcopal Church.
- 1871 The Methodists began construction of their first church building. They moved into the building in March 1872.
- 1873 Construction of first parsonage beside church began.
- 1879 Debt on first church building retired.
- 1891 Replacement parsonage (#2) built next to church.
- 1906 Second church building constructed on same site.
- 1910 Debt on second building retired.
- 1922-1925 Sunday School unit added to second church building.
- 1941 Name of church changed from Methodist Episcopal Church to First Methodist Church (due to denominational merger).
- 1954-1956 Education Building constructed north of parsonage.
- 1956 Debt on Education Building retired.
- 1959 Parsonage purchased at 1303 23<sup>rd</sup> Avenue Court.
- 1961 Second parsonage purchased at 1808 27<sup>th</sup> Street. (The old parsonage between sanctuary and education building was then torn down.)
- 1963 Third (current) church building constructed. This included the sanctuary area, plus the hallway connecting sanctuary and education building. The "hallway" included church offices and library all in one story, at that time.
- 1965 First Methodist Church of Greeley gave \$8,000 to the Rocky Mountain Conference of Methodist Church for the purchase of land for an additional Methodist Church in the Greeley Area. A site was then purchased by the Conference on 35<sup>th</sup> Avenue, just East of Greeley West High School.
- 1969 Church name changed to First United Methodist Church (due to denominational merger).
- 1970 Centennial of FUMC. Retired debt on 1963 construction.
- 1984 Property at 2400 block of 35<sup>th</sup> Avenue sold by the Rocky Mountain Conference of UMC to Light & Light Fellowship - a Free Methodist Church. Reasons: second thoughts on suitability of location and need for a 2<sup>nd</sup> United Methodist church in Greeley.
- 1987-1988 Renewal of building that included redecorating sanctuary, new entryway on west side, second floor in connecting "hallway", elevator to all five levels of building, remodeling of offices and library, and installation of two new handicapped accessible restrooms.
- 1995 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Renewal debt paid off. Mortgage burned on Easter Sunday.

A Celebration Committee is forming and will be meeting soon to start plans for a 150 year celebration. If you would like to be a part of this committee please let the church office know. Or sign up at the table outside the office.
