Greetings, Dear Ones, in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

In small towns it is a common practice for all the local churches to work together to provide ministries that we couldn't do alone. One of those meetings about this time of year we were making plans for the annual Halloween trunk or treat and costume parade. A pastor said that his church would not participate in this event. We were all fine with this and were moving on. However, he couldn't leave it there. He proceeded to tell us that none of our churches should participate in celebrating Satan's holiday. I have heard this so often. Many pastors that come from a non-denominational background don't participate in the liturgical or church calendar. They aren't educated in many of the church traditions and rituals. Most don't participate in Advent or lighting the Advent candles. They often work off incorrect information.

When he called Halloween Satan's holiday, I tried to explain the origins of Halloween. Halloween means Holy Eve. It is the night before All Saints Day. On All Saints Day we remember and celebrate the lives of the people who are connected to the church that have passed into God's glory over the last year. Halloween became a time when people remember loved one who were not connected to the church and have passed. That is why Halloween started out with costumes of ghosts and skeletons. I remember this young pastor responding with, "I don't know why anyone would want to remember those people that were not connected to the church." The answer to that question is very simple. We remember them because we and God love them.

Even though Halloween is not a church sanctioned Holiday, that simple answer strikes at the heart on the gospel message. God loves you; God loves your neighbor, God loves the person sitting in the same pew as you on Sunday, and God loves the person that has never entered a church. We call this love, Prevenient Grace. It is the idea that God loves us, draws near to us, and longs to be with us even before we know we need God. It is a promise that God still loves even our bad version of ourselves. Let's be honest, that is a promise that we all probably rely on a little too much.

Now days, the church continues to read the names of church members who have passed over the last year. We have also expanded that list to include any names that someone would like lifted up. Why? All are loved by God. May we all be blessed with the memories of those we loved the peace of knowing that God loves them, and God loves you.



A small, but industrious, group from FUMC painted the outside of the Zero Net Energy home at the Mission Springs development on Saturday, August 7th. To check out these homes, go south on 23rd Avenue to Quay Street. Turn right. An apartment complex is on the left; the Habitat homes are on the right. Notice the variety of attractive Habitat houses.

Three Habitat homes were dedicated during September, meaning that three more families now have ‘forever homes.’ On September 11th, the two-story duplex in Mission Springs was the scene of a celebration. Zafu Gebrehiwot and her five daughters received the key to their new home. Even though it was a hot, hot day, the girls were excited to each get a colorful quilt made by our Sewing for Service group. Zafu said, “My five daughters and I live in a two-bedroom apartment. It is crowded and rent is high. We are immigrants trying to make a good life for the girls.”



The other half of the duplex will be the home of the Koroso and Buliye Family. They have three young children, one just learning to crawl. In his application to Habitat, Mohamed wrote: “Having a home that is in a safe place would be a dream come true. Not having to worry about moving around and having the stability we need to raise our children; it would be a blessing.”
