Pastor's Letter,

Although we are a month from turning our calendars to 2024, Advent is the beginning of the Christian year. Even as we move through the activities and expectations of the holiday season with a mix of excitement and exhaustion, there is also the spirit of change in the air. There is the hope that God is up to something new within us, around us, and through us. We look at the weary world, where there is a constant barrage of bad news: war and violence; soaring costs of housing, food, prescriptions, medical care, and childcare; unprecedented storms and climate events; increased reports of loneliness, isolation, and anxiety; a more entrenched polarization related to politics, religion, and lifestyle. We know that nothing short of earth-shaking will bring the change, the realignment, the peace, and the drawing nearer for which we pray.

We, like the weary souls oppressed by the Roman empire and the religious elite some 2,000 years ago, are waiting for God to come as Messiah and reorder the world into one that the prophets promised, a world marked by justice, freedom, and equity. We need a God who not only cares about us but who is also willing to show up among us, and do something with us, here, now. That is exactly what God set out to do in taking on flesh and coming among the world that God so loves. Jesus, whose name means "God saves," showed us that's just the kind of God we've got. God is not confined in heaven. God stoops toward us, intervening, showing up when we least expect and in ways that surprise. All in God's good time.

In Jesus, God moved heaven and earth to become one of us, to live our life and to die our death. And it is with the expectation that God will continue to both shake things up and put things back together that we wait with hope in the four weeks of Advent. I hope you'll join us as we celebrate and anticipate the life-changing good news that God is coming to us. We are invited to keep our hearts, our minds, our ears, and our eyes open to the possibility that God is on the way.

Both the Advent study and the sermon series will be based on Bishop Will Willimon's new book, "Heaven and Earth: Advent and the Incarnation." For our four Sunday morning worship services of Advent, we will center on the following themes:

- December 3<sup>rd</sup>: Meanwhile (Mark 13:24-37)
- December 10<sup>th</sup>: Surprised (Mark 1:1-8) Bonus: There will be a children's program at this service!
- December 17<sup>th</sup>: Light (John 1:6-8, 19-28) Bonus: The choir will have their program at this service!

And then I hope you'll join us at 1:00 and 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, December 24<sup>th</sup> for a Christmas Eve Candlelight service, where we will celebrate the inbreaking of the light of the world. May you be blessed during this season of waiting and may you make time to reach out to the One who continually reaches out to us.

# Lucky Duckling Daycare



Lucky Duckling Daycare at First United Methodist Church is up and running! We have had a slow start but are working out the kinks and it is really coming together. All inspections have been passed and we are fully licensed. You might like to know that the church basement passed the radon test with flying colors! Currently, we are accepting children ages 1 to 3, and we only need 2 more children who are ages 3-5 to open our preschool room. We continue to be privileged to work with amazing staff, children, and

families and are so grateful to have them.

As we grow, we are seeing bigger needs for our families beyond quality childcare. So far, we have been able to assist these families a little with food, clothing, and blankets for the children, as well as car seats and transportation assistance. If you would like to help us with this, it would be more appreciated and impactful than you might imagine!

#### Family needs:

New/like new condition clothing and shoes for girls and boys, sizes 12 months to 5T.

Shoe sizes: toddler size 4 to 12

Blankets- kids and adult bedding sizes

**Car seats**- boosters and convertible (faces front or backwards), used is fine if they haven't been in an accident. It is sad and shocking how many families in Greeley are not using car seats for their toddlers because they can't afford them.

Diapers- size 3 to 6 and pullup size 2T and up

#### Daycare needs:

**Snacks** - Healthy, shelf stable, kid friendly, easy to serve. Applesauce pouches, Special K Crisps, Belvita snack bars, fruit cups, Nutrigrain bars, Goldfish, apple juice, Cheez-Its crackers. **Extra lunches**- Families are supposed to pack a lunch, but sometimes they are forgotten or insufficient. We need easy meals that we can store on the shelf or frozen and use as needed (such as microwavable mac n cheese bowls).

**Diapers and wipes**- Parents are supposed to provide these, but we always need extra! **Spare clothing** (sizes 12 months to 5t)

Extra blankets for nap time

Sheets for the cots (crib sheets work!)

Clothing, blankets, and sheets can all be used, we are grateful for any help! Cleaning supplies- Bleach, glass cleaner, paper towels

Journey of Paul Trip



The early morning of September 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2023, a group consisting of Tim & Ginger Jansson, Karen Wolf, Kevin Wolf, Kevin & Kim Hilmes, & Donna Hettinger flew from Colorado to Rome, Italy on an adventure of a lifetime as we followed the travels of Paul. In central Rome our guides took us on a walking tour to Tevi Fountain, the Spanish Steps, & multiple sites of the area & where we had our first gelato. On day 2 we toured the Sistine Chapel, St. Peter Basilica, & the Vatican (the Pope was at his summer residence). Day 3 a drive down the Appian Way where Paul walked brought us to the Catacombs of St.

Callixtus. Then on to the Roman Colosseum, Pantheon, Forum, Circus Maximus, Arches of Titus & Constantine & Baths of Caracalla. Then we headed to the Port of Civitavecchia where we boarded the Odyssey of the Sea. Joining us for the remainder of our trip was Deb Hull. Next stop Naples, Italy, for a tour of the ruins of Pompeii under the base of Mt Vesuvius. Gelato #2! After a day of sea travel and enjoying activities offered on ship we landed at Santorini, Greece, at the island of Faros Akrotiriou-oias. An uphill walking tour found us eating lunch at Naoussa Restaurant in Fira overlooking the sea. We returned to shore via cable car then back to the ship aboard a Tender.

After sailing 984 nautical miles we found ourselves at Ephesus (Kusadasi), Turkey, and its ruins including the Library of Celsus. Before returning to our ship, we stopped at a family-owned rug weaving shop.

Monday September 11<sup>th</sup>, we were back in Greece at Mykonos. Our bus took us to the Aegean Sea and a little wading in the water, a monastery tour then a sample of Greek cuisine of orzo, stuffed grape leaves, lamb, black Kalamata olives to name a few. We returned to ship for more on board fun and entertainment.

Ship day 7. Up early for travel to first Corinth and the Corinth canal then Roman ruins. In Athens we visited the Piraeus Museum. Our after-lunch tour was to the Acropolis where some of our group climbed to the top.

Day 8 was a trip to a WWII cemetery at Suda Bay for our first stop in Chania, Crete. It is a memorial to those known & unknown lost. The Arkadi Monastery at Akratiri has been restored by the monks since it suffered some destruction during WWII while the monks were off fighting. Gelato once more in the Streets of Chania Port shopping center!

Ahhh! Another day at sea as we travel through to toe of Italy! A group with members from North Carolina, Georgia, & Massachusetts led by Dr. Olu Brown also joined up with us. Our day started by gathering with them and exploring Paul's letters to Ephesus led by Dr. Brown. Later we observed the volcano, Stromboli letting out puffs as we sailed past on the Tyrrhenian Sea.

Friday September 15<sup>th</sup> 6:30 am. We have sailed 2129 nm and are back in Rome to disembark and catch our plane to Istanbul, Turkey, some of the other group and the Wolfs returned home to America.

Our time (9/16, 9/17, & 9/18) in Cappadocia, Turkey, was filled with exploring the unique rock formations including fairy chimneys & rocks that look like giant mushrooms in Goreme Tauli Milli Park, the Zelve Valley & Goreme Open Air Museum. Some of these formations were hollowed out and used as refuge for the Christians escaping Roman persecution. Cappadocia is also known for its hot air balloon rides, which many in our group did. They were part of 150 balloons that took off very early that Sunday morning.

Then it was off to Kayseri stopping along the way learning how the Byzantine era people lived, seeing evil eye trees, a camel stop of old, the valley of the Hunters and passing by Mount Evciyes, an inactive volcano. A short flight from Kayseri returns us to Istanbul for our last day. Monday, 9/18, we toured the Hagia Sophia Mosque & Blue Mosque with their amazing awesome architecture. Head covers, modest dress and shoes off were required to enter. We sandwiched in shopping at the Grand Bazaar & Spice Bazaar and tried not to get lost in the maze of shops.

We ended our day with a ferry ride on the Bosphorus Strait that goes between the Black Sea and Sea of Marmara that divides Istanbul with the continents of Europe on one side & Asia Minor on the other.

Up at 3am the next day, Tuesday, for a drive to the airport and return home to Colorado.
